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
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Off to the Races ... NASCAR That Is!

NHS Hosts Blood Drive: Students Unite to Save Lives

In a heartwarming display of community spirit and compassion, TCHS National Honor Society hosted a blood drive on February 10th in the high school cafetorium, surpassing goals and demonstrating the power of teamwork among students and the community. The event, organized in collaboration with Versiti, and aimed at raising awareness about the importance of blood donation and its life-saving impact, collected a remarkable 22 pints of blood, providing critical support to local hospitals and patients in need, and saving 62 lives in our community.

This is the third blood drive hosted this year, with a grand total of 77 pints of blood donated. Students, age 16 and older, participated with many stepping up to donate for the first time. Our school community rallied together to promote the event through social media, flyers, and morning announcements, emphasizing the importance of giving back. Faculty members also played a significant role, encouraging students and sharing their own experiences with blood donation. Student donors received baseball hats and treats. Those who donate six times during high school are honored with red cords to wear at graduation.



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Montcalm Community College - Your Free Community College & Trade School

On February 25th a group of seniors from Tri County High School traveled to Montcalm Community College - Greenvil pus to learn about how Montcalm Community College is not only a college, but also a trade school.

Montcalm Community College offers several certificate programs to prepare students for the workforce. Certificates required around 30 credits or (1 year of community college) in applied technology courses. The Certificate programs do not require to take "general

education" courses that are often needed for an associate's degree.

Certificate programs available at MCC:

- Business Management Certificate
- Corrections Officer Certificate
- Digital Arts Certificate
- Early Childhood Development Certificate
- Heating/Ventilation/Air Conditioning Certificate
- Information Processing Assistant Certificate
- Information Technology Certificate
- Skilled Trades Machinist Certificate
- Skilled Trades Maintenance Mechanic Certificate
- Skilled Trades Tool and Die Maker/Designer Certif

MCC is a great option for students who do not want to "go to college" but would like to learn a trade or specific work ski employment. The average cost to attend a regular trade school is about \$15,000 per year. Attending Montcalm Community College for vocational training would cost your student \$0 per year through the Michigan Community College Guarantee

Beginning in the fall 2024, all students from the class of 2023 and beyond (regardless of how much money their parent are eligible for the Michigan Community College Guarantee, which includes:

- In-district tuition, contact hours, and mandatory fees
- Up to three years of attendance

To qualify for the Community College Guarantee you must:

- Be a Michigan resident since July 1 of the previous calendar year
- Be a US citizen, permanent resident, or approved refugee
- Graduate from a Michigan high school
- Earn a diploma, certificate of completion, or GED in 2023 or after
- Complete the FAFSA
- Be enrolled full time (usually 12 credits or 4 classes per semester)
- Enroll into your "In-district" Community College within 15 months of your high school graduation date.

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STEM Class & Media Production


Students in Middle School STEM are learning a new skill! They are learning about media production and digital storytelling. Students in Dr. Adamson's STEM class, in collaboration with the Michigan Learning Channel and PBS, are creating short videos that highlight something that makes their community iconic. Students are learning how to set up the production equipment, including tripods, lights, sound buffers, and more. They're also learning how to interview and record their work for editing later! Learning these skills turn students into their own directors and producers while working on their digital media stories.

The students worked on installing a short wall of soundproof panels to help absorb sound when recording media and are working on recording narratives for their iconic videos, as well as conducting interviews to tie into their digital storytelling. Understanding how recording sounds is just one small piece of the work that students are doing.

Completed student videos will be aired sometime next year in connection with PBS and the Michigan Learning Channel. We can't wait to see their completed projects.



MS Math Workshop



The Middle School Math Department Team has been working with Marcus Deja, a Math Coach from Kent ISD, this year exploring the Workshop Model. The team's goal was to increase student engagement and movement.

Class begins with a sample problem where students are asked to share noticings, wonderings, and predictions. Then they are dispersed in small groups to work on one or two sample problems. Students are encouraged to collaborate together to find the solution with minimal direction from the teacher. The class then comes together to discuss findings, challenges, and possible solutions. Students then work independently or with a partner to complete additional problems for understanding. Both the teachers and students have been enjoying the varied instructional strategies.

Mrs. Phinney's and Miss Thomsen's classes work in small groups around the room exploring and solving problems.

Cold Temps Bring Opportunity for Learning

On Monday, January 20th, the coldest day of the new year, the students of Classroom #94, along with Principal Kurtz, saw an opportunity for cold learning fun. The frigid temperatures with a high of -12 degrees Fahrenheit were just right for blowing bubbles and watching the icy crystals form, spread and eventually take over the bubble. When the bubble pops, it shatters into feather like slivers of bubbles and they continue to glide across the ground in the wind. This activity happened to take place on a day when the sun was over the horizon and its brilliant light combined with snow crystals in the air cast a vertical rainbow. A combination of ideal air temperature, bubble mixture, and the tools used are necessary in order for this activity to be a success

The school bank is open for business twice a month for students to bring in money to deposit into their Independent Bank account. This is a great opportunity for students to learn various banking skills in addition to all students learning about how to use money responsibly, savings, and finance. 
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
