Schools of Choice Information

Tri County Area Schools participates in a county-wide cooperative Schools of Choice program. The MAISD Cooperative Schools of Choice Agreement replaces the former 105/105c program.

Guidelines and forms for applying for Schools of Choice can be found on our website, under the enrollment tab. A couple of points/factors for SOC enrollment:

- 1) Two (2) open window periods for application for the 2025-2026 school year:
 - 1st Semester July 1 through September 12
 - 2nd Semester December 1 through January 9
- 2) Students must be in good standing in their resident district to apply (example: poor attendance, poor academic standing, behavior, etc.)

Tri County Area Schools announces the sponsorship of the Summer Food Service Program for Children for 2025, in cooperation with the USDA. **FREE** meals will be made available to all children 18 years of age and under, and persons up to age 26 who participate in a school program for people with disabilities. Meals are provided without regard to race, color, national origin, age, sex, or disability.

This year these Grab-n-Go style meal bundles will include shelf stable food items, cold items, fresh produce, and two (2) half gallons of milk per child (1-white & 1-chocolate). And, as a bonus, each family will receive a reuseable milk tote bag.

Meal pickup takes place every Thursday, June 12 through August 7, during the summer at the following location:

High School Launches an Exciting Partnership with Mecosta-Osceola Career Center

Our High School is expanding career readiness and hands-on learning opportunities with a new partnership with Mecosta-Osceola Career Center starting this fall 2025. MOCC is located in Big Rapids, where it currently serves students from Big Rapids, Chippewa Hills, Evart, Morley Stanwood, and Reed City. This new partnership is in addition to our long-standing partnership with Newaygo County Career Tech Center.

Starting this fall, students will have the opportunity to enroll in specialized courses at Mecosta-Osceola Career Center, which features state-of -the-art facilities and programs. The learning opportunities and career exploration areas include: agriscience and natural resources, healthcare, automotive technology, construction, cosmetology, information technology, manufacturing, culinary arts, diesel technology, education, protective services/corrections, welding, and graphic design/printing. The career center programs listed are designed to equip students with practical skills and certifications that can lead directly to employment or serve as a strong foundation for further education.

Whether students are headed to college, into a trade, military, or directly into the workforce, the collaboration with both Newaygo County Career Tech Center and Mecosta-Osceola Career Center gives them a head start on building a successful future. In addition to career-focused classes, career centers also open the door to internships, job shadowing, and mentorship opportunities with local businesses and industry professionals. These experiences are designed to deepen students' understanding of real-world work environments and help them build valuable networks. We are excited to begin this new partnership this fall.

6th Graders Study Latin America

Sixth graders in Mrs. Hetler's Geography class completed their study of Latin America, learning about the history and cultures of the Olmec, Mayas, Aztecs and Incas, Mexico, Central America, the Caribbean and South America. Students studied their governments, natural resources, trade, transportation and the challenges facing these areas. Also, students created political maps and physical maps of the areas.

They ended the unit with a big fiesta, celebrating the different cultures of Latin America. Classes brought in different Latin America dish, watched a movie, and listened to Latin American music while enjoying a meal. Some of the foods the students were able to sample were chocolate covered strawberries, pineapple, Hispanic smores, burritos, tacos, churros, beans, street corn, tamales, rice, Dulce de Leche cake, bananas, various cookies, hot chocolate, Jarritos, chips & salsa, and pico de gallo.

Creativity Takes Place with 3D Pens in STEM

STEM students worked on 3D creations with the 3D pens. Students in the 3rd and 5th hour created city structures, made a diagram that incorporated area and perimeter into their designs, then combined the pieces to construct a city. Students in 4th and 6th hour used the 3D pens in connection with principles of flight. They folded paper airplanes, then tested them to see how far they would fly. They used the 3D pens to trace the lines of the paper airplane, then removed the paper to form an exo-skeleton. Students worked to build a rocket and created a 3D airplane and tested the flight principles of both.

ODYSSEY OF THE MIND TEAM ADVANCES TO WORLD FINALS

The Middle School Odyssey of the Mind team advanced to the World Finals competition this spring, which was held at Michigan State University May 21-24. Odyssey of the Mind (OM) is an international program that encourages creative problem-solving. OM also emphasizes teamwork, budgeting, time management, public speaking, and so much more. These are invaluable skills for students to learn at a young age.

The six students on the Middle School team are: Berkley Armstrong, Roxanne Pake, Elly Reichart, McKenna Sanford, Elizabeth (Lella) Shadley, and Guinevere (Evvie) Trowbridge. These OM teammates spent countless hours over the past six months working after school to write an original script, create costumes, build props, and even engineered a robotic animal to showcase their creativity, ingenuity, and humor within an 8-minute skit.

In February, the team competed at the regional level, where they advanced to the state competition, which was held on March 15. They received a high score for their problem, called "Mech-Animal Sidekick," giving them the opportunity to go to the World Finals! The last time the district sent a team to this prestigious event was in 2019.

At the World finals, the team had the opportunity to meet other kids from 24 other countries around the world through

pin trading, and they partnered with a buddy team from Poland. Students also participated in a Creativity Festival which included Arm and Hammer activities, NASA demonstrations, and creative challenges. It was a wonderful experience for these well-rounded, high achieving students.
